

—Information on Cutaneous Lymphomas—

Cutaneous (Skin) Lymphomas are a type of cancer of white blood cells that you can develop in the skin, either as part of a whole body process or a localized one. Primary skin lymphomas develop and often stay in the skin, instead of the lymph nodes, spleen, or bone marrow. They are divided in two categories—cutaneous T-cell lymphomas (CTCL) and cutaneous B-cell lymphomas (CBCL).

CTCL (Cutaneous T cell lymphoma) is a general term for many lymphomas of the skin including mycosis fungoides, Sézary syndrome, cutaneous anaplastic large cell lymphoma, adult T-cell leukemia/lymphoma, and peripheral T-cell lymphoma.


Mycosis fungoides (MF) is the most common type of CTCL. It is a low-grade lymphoma that primarily affects the skin. It usually has a slow course and remains confined to the skin. Skin-directed therapies include ultraviolet light treatment, topical steroids, and topical chemotherapies (nitrogen mustard). Systemic treatments are sometimes used for more advanced cases.
